

The Mountain or Zoar



We're all familiar with the story of Lot and his wife, their flight from Sodom, and the tragic fate of Lot's wife, who transformed into a pillar of salt when she dared to glance back. However, another part of this story goes beyond the yearning of Lot's wife for the life she was leaving behind.

The angels led them safely outside the city, and once they were out, they told Lot, "Save your life! Don't look back! Don't stop anywhere in the plain but flee to the mountains!"

The Bible often employs the symbol of the mountain to signify God's strength, protection, and divine presence. Psalm 18:2 refers to God as a solid rock and stronghold: "The LORD is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer; my God, my strength, in whom I will trust; my buckler, and the horn of my salvation, and my high tower." Here, the mountain resembles a 'high tower'— a safe place above the world's dangers.

In Psalms 121:1-2, the Psalmist looks to the mountains for help, symbolizing again the mountain as a source of divine aid: "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the LORD, which made heaven and earth." This suggests that the mountain, in its grandeur and stability, embodies the strength and reliability of God as our help and protector.

In Exodus 19:20, we see the mountain as the place of divine encounter: "And the LORD came down upon Mount Sinai, on the top of the mount: and the LORD called Moses up to the top of the mount, and Moses went up." The mountain is presented as a holy place, a locus of God's presence and revelation, underscoring the idea of the mountain as a symbol of divine protection and guidance, offering us reassurance and security in our faith.

Therefore, when the Bible symbolically refers to a mountain, it often references God's strength, protection, and divine presence, reminding us of His everlasting love and care for us.

But Lot protested, "No, I can't flee to the mountains; the disaster will overtake me, and I'll die. Look, here's a town near enough to run to. Let me flee there, and my life will be saved."

The angel replied, "Very well, I will grant this request and not overthrow the town you mention. But quickly flee there because I can't do anything until you reach it."

Why did Lot choose to settle in the city of Zoar, despite the advice of God's messenger to seek haven in the mountain?

Lot, filled with fear, might have doubted his ability to reach the mountain in time, questioning whether his legs could carry him swiftly enough toward that place of safety.
